PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What a wonderful Show!

I give great thanks and hearty praise to every member who helped put this inaugural event together. As Show Chairman, Susan Fasnacht showed unparalleled organization and leadership. I spoke with vendors who were happy with the new venue and amazed at the smooth transition. The guests I spoke to loved the new space. I love the new space, as did every member I saw. Ladies, and Don, WE DID GOOD!

We learned a few things that will be changed or improved next year, as one would expect. The ever helpful John Murphy knows our needs more thoroughly and can function better next time also. I believe it was truly to our advantage that we were forced into making this change after 35 years in the same place. Start right now to make more of the spectacular quilts that were getting rave reviews from everyone who viewed them. One remark I heard, "this is better than Lancaster."

Photographers were recording everything and Maria will soon have photos on the website. She will send an e-blast when they are ready for your viewing.

I want to remind you here that this IS the President's Message and in the next paragraphs I am speaking only for myself, not representing anyone or any group.

A number of our new members have let me know that they were upset at the tone of our last meeting and questioned why they joined the Guild. To them I apologize. That is not our true face. For some reason it seems to happen every 5 years when it is time to adjust our By-laws to fit changes in the world and changes in our Guild needs. We really are a dedicated group of quilters and fiber artists who want to share their inspirations and their knowledge with one another. Help and friendship go along with this sharing. We are happy to have each of you join us and hope you will give us the opportunity to prove who we really are.

With the thought that we might have smoother sailing in 5 years I offer a few things to consider. As Americans, everyone has the right to have their views expressed. But once expressed, matters should be left to the vote of the entire group. I am not sure it is fair to equate the By-laws of a 100% volunteer quilt guild to the Constitution and the Federal Government. Our By-laws are important. They are the backbone of our organization. Our Policies are, likewise, an important tool. Our elected Board of Directors can hold office for only 2 years in any position so tools to help them operate effectively are needed. About the time they are familiar with how to do their job, they are out of it and their replacement starts the learning process. Within this framework we have to remember that everyone is a volunteer, we all have another side to our life. Some have full time jobs, many have families they are tending to, or both, so we must allow for human error at times. Sometimes that human error puts a glitch in our system and we have to rethink what is important to do next.

Recently we had a glitch. I understand the importance of following the By-laws. The By-laws are there in the first place as a requirement of being a corporation, which we are. As a corporation we are also required to hold an Annual Meeting at which Board of Directors are elected and a vote is taken on any proposed By-laws changes. So, when the glitch occurs do we bend a little on By-laws requirements for the method used to inform the membership of impending changes? They were in fact notified in the required time frame. Or do we stand firm on By-laws details and in doing so, violate our requirement to vote on By-laws changes at our Annual meeting so the results are recorded in the Minutes? The Annual meeting is the only general meeting which records Minutes. The circumstances at what was to be a discussion meeting last month have put us in the second category. The good news is....in either case, there really aren't any corporate police out looking for us. This is just food for thought on how to handle things in the future and offered in the hope that peace exists at the question/answer session on By-laws changes at the Annual Meeting this month, with the vote to take place in June.

Sr. Barbara Memorial Donation

At the April Board meeting the Board voted to donate the NSQG Policy limit of \$250 to the Mustard Seed Migrant Ministry in Goshen, NY. in memory of Sr. Barbara Heil. Their purpose is to provide the children of migrant workers a place to find self-worth and stability as well as food and friendship. Sr. Barbara loved working with these children and involved KC students in the work with her.

Mustard Seed does not fall into an accepted category for NSQG donations (only quilt related charities) so the Board voted unanimously to override the policy in this unique circumstance. The membership is invited to make personal contributions for added impact to the Guild donation.

2. Bring your envelope to the May meeting with "Mustard Seed" noted on envelope.
3. Or, mail it to NSQG President, P.O.Box 232, Somers, NY 10589. (note "Mustard Seed" on envelope.)
4. All checks collected will be taken to Mustard Seed together with the Guild donation and given to a representative that I will contact beforehand.

Quilt Show

"A World of Quilts XXXVII" – all I can say is WOW! What a magnificent display of quilts. Nearly 95% of the 189 registered quilts on display were made by our guild members, and each quilt was wonderful. It was one of the most beautiful displays of quilts ever for the Show making our inaugural Show at the O'Neill Center that more memorable.

I also can't say enough for the volunteerism of our members. I know I have received numerous congratulations on how well the Show went, but it would not have been possible without the help of you. The Quilt Show Committee members were great and I can't thank them enough for carrying out their assignments with an efficiency that allowed me to concentrate on other details of the Show. I also want to thank all of the Guild members that pitched in to help wherever it was needed. Whether it was sewing sleeves on our drapes, setting up the pipe frames for quilt hanging, taking vouchers at the door, keeping a watchful eye for something that was happening as it should, or helping address any of the other "glitches" we encountered at the Show, our members stepped up to make it work. It certainly helped make my work easier.

Although I don't have a final tally on the financial aspect of the Show, it did well. We had about 1,500 attendees come through the box office. While that is generally a slight decline in our historic attendance figures, it was comparable to last year's number. I am certain with the positive comments we heard from the attendees that this number will grow as more people hear about the first class Show we put on.

We have already started thinking of next year's Show. I've been compiling a list of what worked and what didn't (and yes, you can send me your ideas). What should we do differently? Chris and Noreen will be looking for a great team for their committee. If you want to get involved and help make the Show even better, contact either one of them. It's a great way to meet people and get involved in the Guild. And don't forget, it's not too early to start working of your entry for "A World of Quilts XXXVIII"!

Meet the 2016-2017 Candidates

Presented here are the informational Bios from the candidates chosen by the Nominating Committee for the 2016-2017 NSQG Board. Voting will take place at the Guild Annual Meeting on May 17, 2016.

President – Susan Fasnacht

After serving two years as VP, Quilt Show, I am pleased to have the opportunity to move up to the position of President. The challenge of organizing this year's Quilt Show at its new venue, the O'Neill Center, has helped prepare me for the office of President by giving me better insight into how the Guild operates. It has also provided me with a genuine appreciation of how great our Guild is, with its members who so generously volunteer their time to help. I hope to continue fostering that spirit over the next year.

Technology changes have resulted in new and different ways to communicate, organize our lives, and even how we sew. The Guild has started to embrace these changes this year with the roll out of our new website and the increased use of email to communicate with our members. Notification of Proposed Amendments to the Northern Star Quilters' Guild By-Laws

The Article of the current by-laws of the Northern Star Quilters' Guild which pertains to amending the by-laws is:

ARTICLE XI: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

Section 1. Amendments to the By-Laws may be:

- a. Proposed in writing by the Board of Directors
- b. Proposed in writing by a member or members
- c. Recommended by a By-Law Review Committee convened by the President no less than every five (5) years, beginning in 2005.

Section 2. After approval by a majority of the Board of Directors, any proposed amendment shall be mailed to the general membership, and shall be published in the Guild's newsletter. The proposed amendments shall be voted on by ballot by the members no sooner than thirty (30) days after notification to the members.

Section 3. Amendments shall be approved by a majority of the members voting.

An e-mailed notification of Proposed By-laws Amendments was sent to the membership on April 11, 2016 (35 days before the Annual meeting.) A discussion of the proposed By-Law amendments was started at the April Guild meeting. There were some who thought there was not enough time to consider the changes and some who objected to the proposed amendments being emailed to the membership rather than mailed by USPS. Because of this, the decision was made to have the vote on the By-Laws postponed to the June meeting rather than the Annual Meeting in May. This mailing contains a REVISED FORMAT of the Proposed By-law Amendments with an expanded rationale.

The voting on the proposed amendments to the By-Laws will be as follows: There will be a question and answer period at the Annual Meeting in May. Voting will be by ballot at the June meeting.

REVISED FORMAT with expanded rationale

Proposed Amendment #1

Current By-Laws: ARTICLE IX: AUDIT

Section 1. The treasurer shall submit the guild's financial books and records for an annual compilation, review or audit, as required, after the close of the fiscal year, and at any other time it is deemed necessary.

Section 2. The records and books shall be submitted to a Certified Public Accountant for the purpose specified in Section 1. The cost of such action shall be a legitimate Guild expense.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall require two copies, certified as true, of the results. One shall go to the Treasurer's file, and the other to the Secretary's file with the corporate records.

Rationale for change: In signing an agreement with our new Certified Public Accountant it became clear that this Article in our By-Laws is outdated and would be extremely expensive to adhere to today. We do not submit "books." Today's electronic bookkeeping methods leave little room for error and actual audits or compilations have become unnecessary except for large businesses or in extreme cases. CPA's are hesitant to "certify as true" on their letterhead without a hefty fee since an actual audit is not performed. We do not do the kind of business that would require a formal financial statement from a CPA. One could be obtained if such a circumstance should occur. The primary function of our CPA is to make adjustments to QuickBooks if necessary in his preparation of tax returns. In doing so he will discuss with us any discrepancies he finds and corrections may be made.

For these reasons a financial committee was formed last summer consisting of Mary Mahedy, Linda Ostrander, Peggy Morgan and Joyce Sullivan who put forth the following amendment to the By-laws. The proposed amendment was approved by the Board.

Proposed By-Law: ARTICLE IX: FINANCIAL

Section 1. The Treasurer shall submit the Guild's financial records for examination, preparation and filing of Income Tax Returns after the close of the fiscal year.

Section 2. The records shall be submitted to an independent Certified Public Accountant for the purposes specified in Section 1. The cost shall be a legitimate Guild expense.

Section 3. The Board of Directors may, at their discretion, require an internal audit or seek additional services from a Certified Public Accountant if deemed necessary.

The NSQG By-Laws require the By-laws be reviewed every five years starting in 2005. For this reason, a By-Law Committee was formed in November with Barbara Sferra, Althea Nolan and Nancy Mirman as Chairman. The Committee made second and third recommended changes which were approved by the Board.

Proposed Amendment #2

Current By-Law: ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of the Guild shall be to promote interest in, and encourage participation in, the art of quilting; to stimulate and coordinate the efforts and talents of individuals interested in quilting; and to maintain a club for the social enjoyment of its members.

Section 2. The Guild shall strive to achieve its purposes:

- a. By establishing lines of communication among members for the stimulation of thought, exchange of ideas, mutual assistance, and enhancement of individual strengths.
- b. By providing educational activities related to quilting to help members achieve their highest level of technical proficiency and artistic expression.
- c. By sponsoring an annual quilt show, open to the public.

Rationale for change: Charitable activities are an important part of our Guild. When a new site for the Quilt Show was being researched, it became evident that there is nothing in the By-Laws which addresses this. A concern was raised at the meeting as to whether adding this statement to our by-laws would jeopardize our 501(c)(3) status. Our accountant who is an expert in tax exempt accounting has assured us that adding item C below is fine. "It is a good additional clause that supports your mission statement."

Proposed By-Law: ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of the Guild shall be to promote interest in, and encourage participation in, the art of quilting; to stimulate and coordinate the efforts and talents of individuals interested in quilting; and to maintain a club for the social enjoyment of its members.

Section 2. The Guild shall strive to achieve its purposes"

- a. By establishing lines of communication among members for the stimulation of thought, exchange of ideas, mutual assistance, and enhancement of individual strengths.
- b. By providing educational activities related to quilting to help members achieve their highest level of technical proficiency and artistic expression.
- c. By supporting and maintaining quilt related charitable activities.
- d. By sponsoring an annual quilt show, open to the public.
