

#### LIBRARY NEWS

"Applique" is the subject of our featured books for the month of December. I have added the following three books to help round out our library's applique section. Many thanks to the guild member who brought this area of need to my attention.

Red and Green: An Applique
Tradition, written by Jeana Kimball, is a
wonderful and beautifully illustrated text
on traditional appliqued quilts. The book
begins with a concise and well-researched
history of applique as well as a few short
biographies of nineteenth-century
quiltmakers. It then moves on to patterns
and clearly written instructions for
creating 24 classic applique blocks, and
ends with the "Gallery" - a photographic
collection of many nineteenth-century
appliqued quilts. This is by far the most
complete and well-written book I have
seen on the subject.

Applique Borders: An Added Grace, also written by Jeana Kimball, is the next step after constructing your applique blocks, above. This is a concise guide to choosing and designing appliqued borders to enhance your quilts, and contains full size patterns (with corners) for sixteen original appliqued borders. Another inspirational book from this very talented quiltmaker.

Design a Baltimore Album Quilt! by Elly Sienkiewicz, is a "Teach-Yourself" course in sets and borders. This design workbook includes eighteen lesson plans with cut-and-paste scaled pictures of blocks, sashings, medallion centers, and borders. Have a ball playing with these little paper quilts as you learn which sets and borders you like best - even more fun than paper dolls!

Quilts and Quilting from Threads: Two copies of this wonderful collection of Threads Magazine articles on quilting were donated by Taunton Press.



#### \*\*\* ON MAKING CONTINUOUS BIAS \*\*\*

The following directions are offered on USING A ROTARY CUTTER TO MAKE CONTINUOUS BIAS. This technique will be demonstrated before the Dec. 21 meeting at 7:15.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Starting with a rectangle of fabric of any size, cut off all selvedges. Beginning at a corner, make a true bias cut.











Bring side A to side B and seam together.









Using your rotary cutter and ruler, but the width bias you need, sutting to within 1" of straight lines.





Now, offsetting by the width of your bias, seam (C & D) straight sides together.







With scissors, snip remaining 2" to connect cuts and you have a long bias strip.

Linda Brannock and Jan Patek had no knowledge of and would not have approved of the sale of imported quilts manufactured from our designs as depicted in Land's End October Coming Home cataglog.

The copyright for these designs is owned by the publisher, Red Wagon, and not by the designers. We have no control over, nor do we profit from, the sale of these designs. After signing petitions against the Smithsonian for making copies of American Heritage quilts out of the country, this has been like a stab in the back.

As American quiltmakers we have been deeply upset by this.
