Connecticut members should listen to

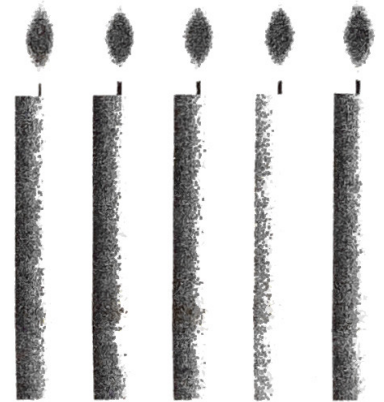
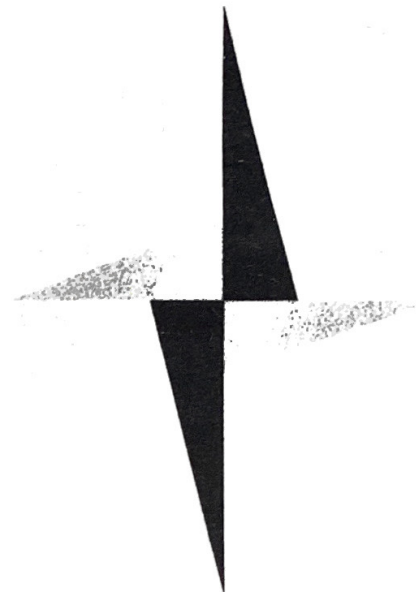
radio station WINE (940 AM or 95.1 FM) for NSQG cancellation.

On the Road Again

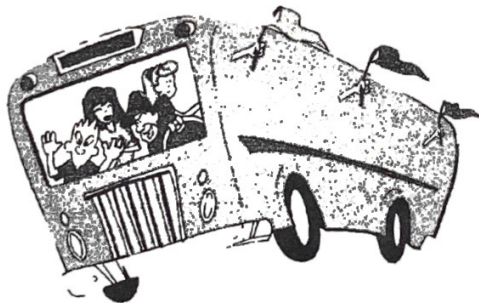

Quilt Show Registration Information

For those of you who are already anxious to start registering your quilts for the World of Quilts XXI, the registration forms will be available at the January Guild Meeting. In the meantime, the categories have remained the same as for the 1999 Show. They are as follows:

Predominantly Hand Quilted Quilts

- 100 Hand Quilted Pieced Bed Quilts
- 200 Hand Quilted Pieced Wallhangings
- 300 Hand Quilted Appliqued Bed Quilts
- 400 Hand Quilted Appliqued Wallhangings
- 500 Mixed Construction Technique Bed Quilts (variety of techniques used)
- 600 Mixed Construction Technique Wallhangings (variety of techniques used)

Predominantly Machine Quilted Quilts

- 700 Machine Quilted Bed Quilts
- 800 Machine Quilted Wallhangings—perimeter of 240” or larger
- 900 Machine Quilted Wallhangings—perimeter more than 144” and less than 240”
- 1000 Machine Quilted Wallhangings—perimeter of 144” or less

Special Category Quilts

- 1100 Miniature Quilts—overall pattern reflecting reduced scale; perimeter not to exceed 96”
- 1200 Special Techniques—all sizes; unusual techniques such as yoyos, crazy quilts, photo transfer, whole cloth, stenciled or painted fabric and embellished quilts.
- 1300 Group Quilts—all sizes and techniques; quilt made by two or more persons, including those constructed by one person and quilted by another; combined efforts will be noted in the catalog and on the display card.
- 1400 Young Quilters—all sizes and techniques; piece must be made by a youth 14 years or younger with little or no help from an adult.
- 1500 Unjudged—also including antique quilts and articles of clothing.

The theme for this year's block contest is: “Little Green Things.” The block must measure an accurate 12 1/2” square, including seam allowance. Do not bind or finish the edges! Use prewashed, 100% cotton fabric. Your block must contain a “green thing.”

All entrants will receive one of our beautiful show pins and the finalists will receive fabric packets. The finalists' blocks will be assembled into a quilt top which will be awarded in a random drawing to one of our finalists.

The deadline for submitting your entry is March 1, 2000. No exceptions! Entry forms will be available at the monthly meetings.

Thanks to all of you who brought fabrics to exchange in October and November. If anyone else would like to exchange please look for me and I will be glad to explain it to you:

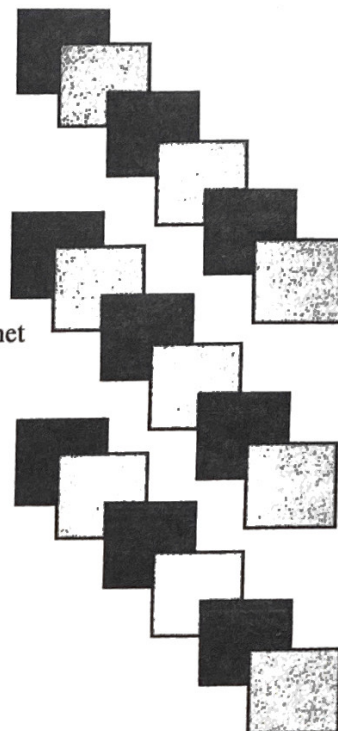
1. Fabric must be 100% cotton of quilting weight.
2. Fabrics must be washed, pressed and cut into 6" squares.
3. Each square must have a clear, identifiable image of theme.
4. Place 6 different fabrics of this month's theme in a clear sandwich bag with your name on the bag. You could bring as many bags as you want, 6 is a good number.

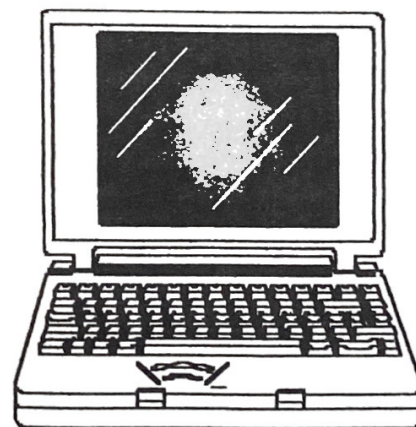

Susan Henshaw has offered to teach a class in making Teddy Bears. She has an easy pattern and who doesn't love these wonderful Toys?

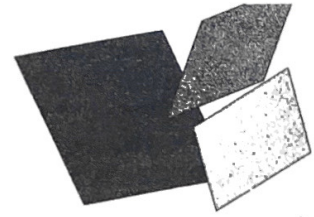
Denise Kaplan—A Bird in the Air—a glorious scrap quilt. What a great way to use up your stash.

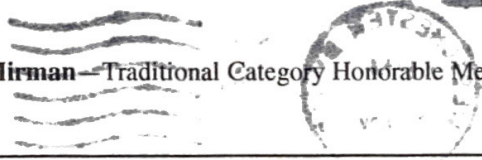
Award Winners—1999 PIQF

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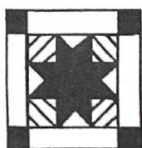
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
