A letter from Ginny Watson.

Dear NSQG Friends,

I miss all of vou! Especially on your meeting nights! I hope everyone of you really appreciate what you have!!...friends.support group. classes, good teaches. fabric shops. Please support and enjoy all of them!!!!!!!!!

There's a little shop called "Quilts, Sew and Mo" about 15 miles from us. There are about 20 bolts of fabric and one small board of notions. When I asked about a guild the reply was "What is a guild?". Right then I knew I was in BIG trouble! There are two small proups in Lynchburg (50m1) and one small one in Roanoke (30mi). Betty Hatfield, former NSQG member belongs to this one. I haven't found a shop in Roakoke yet. The Lynchburg shop has mostly Hoffman fabrics because a "Crafts & More" moved into the shopping center and they have lots of cheap (poor quality) fabric which really hurt their business. They have a few classes and a small Bernina Club.

I've decided to try to start a quilt quild here on the Lake With Betty to teach applique, we would have a prize winning quilter to start classes too!

I may have to use fabric on hand!
(I did bring almost all of it with
me!) Not having a place to browse
for fabric and meet people of like
mind is frustrating, stressful,
etc!!

However, the house is progessing well. We hope to be in by the first of March. The 10" of snow since Thanksgiving, lots of ice and a low of 8 shut us down for about 3 weeks. I threatened to move back North where the winters were milder!

Happy New Year and Happy Quilting to one and all. Do come and wisit us on Smith Mt. Lake... It really is beautiful!

ABOUT JUDGING A THINK PIECE FOR QUILTERS----

Why are quilt shows judged? Who are asked to be judges? How can we profit from judging? Understanding the answers to these questions can make a judged quilt show more interesting for us all amd more valuable to the participants.

Why do we judge?

The two major purposes of judging quilts are 1) to contribute to the growth and development ofquiltmakers—to help them learn and improve; 2) to determine how they might improve by showing how well the quilts meet accepted standards of quality.

Who are the judges?
Judges are people-people who want
to see quiltmakers lear, and to
see the art of quiltmaking grow
and improve. Judges may be
teachers, artists, famous
quilters, or just a person willing
to serve in that capacity. MQA
Certified Judges however, have
undersone a rigorous testing
program to assure their
qualifications as quilt judges.
They have a broad knowledge of
quiltmaking, quilt shows, and the
judging process.


How can we profit from Judging? The process of judging will never be perfect and results will vary from show to show. This is inevitable since shows vary in size and kinds of entries, show committees often want different things emphasized (for example, workmanship versus design), and not all Judges have the same background or opinions.

To protit from judging therefore, we must learn to accept judging for what it can do for us. Learn what we can from it but don't make it a matter of life or death. Consider it an adventure to stimulate us to greater achievements. Let judging be one step among many to improve quiltmaking and inspire quiltmakers.


