A Message from the President

On Point has been mailed to every member this month so that everyone will have the opportunity to read and review the proposed By-Law document. Andrea Winter and Barbara Sliter have prepared a brief cover letter to explain the various types of revisions.

By-Laws are a group's basic policies. They spell out what kind of leadership is required, its responsibilities and policy making authority, how to transition from one Board of Directors to the next, and the details of purpose, membership, dues, and meetings. They contain the basic rules relating to the group and insure the rights of its members whether present or absent from a meeting.

You shouldn't have to be an attorney to read your own By-Laws. The intent is that they should be easy to read and understand and that each member can become familiar with the Guild's structure and thereby become a more active participant in Guild affairs.

The Board held a special meeting in February so that we could continue our discussion of this document without the distraction of our regular business. It was distributed in advance giving everyone the opportunity to read and compare it to the current By-Laws at a time when they could give it their undivided attention. We want each of you to have the same opportunity to read and decide for yourself if it protects your rights of membership. Remember that there is a copy of the current By-Laws in the back of your phone directory and also on the website, so that you can do an article by article comparison.

The Board voted unanimously to recommend these revised By-Laws to the membership for approval at the annual meeting in May. We have made this extra effort to give you adequate time to raise questions and for us all to be comfortable with the answers before the voting takes place. There will be a question and answer session at the April meeting. If anyone has questions after reading it, please contact me or any Board Member as that may help us clarify any concerns for others as well. There is documentation of the meetings of the By-Law Review committee and the reasoning and discussions that took place pertaining to each article. We can make a copy of that available to any one who desires to read more about the process.

This is the result of several years of work and input from multiple Boards, a past presidents committee, and the current five year review committee. We hope that you will support this revision and thank all of those who have helped to update the By-Laws.

We have an exciting meeting planned for March and look forward to seeing you there.

Our annual Quilt Show is an important part of fulfilling our mission. World of Quilts enjoys an excellent reputation for having a well-judged quilt exhibit, exciting vendors, and many other interesting educational programs.

We continue to be popular with our attendees because we make them comfortable while they are here. We have an efficient admissions process, a good floor and vendor layout, easy-to-read signage. Maps make it easy to find exhibits, restrooms, vendors and food.

Many hours of work take place before and during the Show by our members to make the Show pleasant for our visitors and members.

Volunteering: Each member of the Guild is expected to do a little something. Even if you won't be in town that weekend, there are many things you can do to help.

Coordinators of each area are actively recruiting volunteers and communicating their needs to those who have worked there in the past. Because many procedures are being updated, written instructions will be provided to all volunteers so that they will know where to go and what to do when they arrive. Experienced team leaders will give guidance to those volunteering in a new area.

If you have a particular job where you would like to help, write to me and I will forward it to the appropriate person. You will also have an opportunity to sign up at the March and April meetings.

Teenagers are also needed throughout the weekend. They will be paid or can receive Community Service letters. Husbands and Significant Others are welcome and will receive a hot meal on Friday night and our undying appreciation!

Publicity: Publicizing our Show now is crucial to being profitable. There is a direct relationship between the profit of the Quilt Show and our Guild Budget. The Quilt Show profit fills the gap between our revenues from dues and the bottom line. Each additional dollar we make at our Show is a dollar that can be spent in the future on more and better programs, or reduce the cost of Super Saturday, or invest in better equipment.

This year our poster and post card features *Changing Colors*, a quilt by Karen Eckmeier, NSQG member and one of this year's Show lecturers.

Each member will receive a full-color postcard and several black and white postcards to distribute to family and

friends. If you know of a gallery or museum where we could distribute some of these postcards, let us know.

The artwork for the poster will be available on the website to print on 8 1/2" x 11" paper on your home printer. This saves the Guild money as well as makes it easier to distribute posters.

Please consider placing one at a grocery store, library, or museum in your area. Don't forget you can even put one in the rear window of your car!

The poster will be also be displayed by Metro-North at stations along the route.

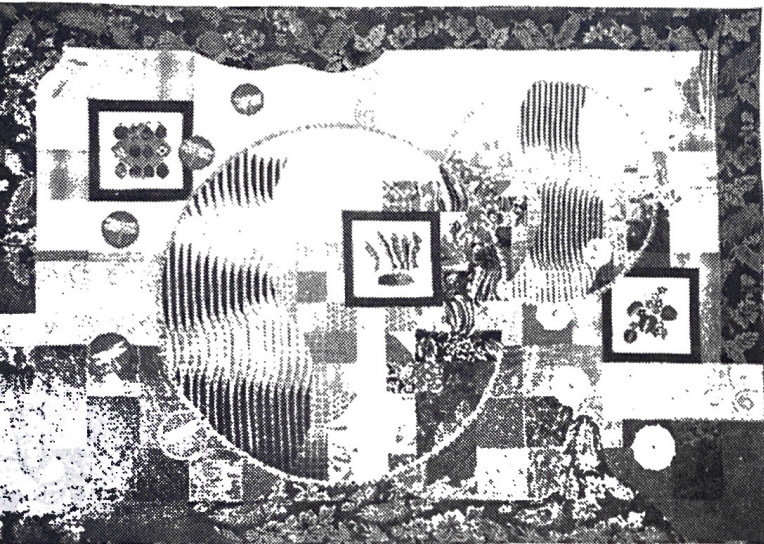
Third Prize of Daiwabo Taupe Fabrics has been generously donated by Pinwheels of Croton on Hudson, New York.

March's One Woman Show – Joyce Sullivan



My sewing began as a child learning the tricks of the trade from my mother. By age ten I was making my own pajama's and simple garments. In high school I always prized the few "store-bought" clothes I was allowed to have not realizing the clothes tailored by my mother or myself should have been the prized items.

I followed in my mother's footsteps and made most of the clothes and home decor items for our family of six. My three daughters danced for many years and I became the Costume Designer and pattern maker for all the children's performances of various dance schools throughout Westchester County.

Quilting came into my life by accident after my husband's death and my move to Heritage Hills in 1986. Needing new friends in this new place I accepted the invitation of some ladies up the street to join them in quilting classes Claire Dehler was giving in Pat Bartimocia's shop in Baldwin Place Mall. I really wasn't interested in learning to quilt, but I figured I would make some friends and I could then drop the quilting.

You know how that went— I am the only one still quilting. Those neighborhood friends still meet weekly but now we

play dominoes. Those quilt classes led me to NSQG where I found more unbelievable friendships, education, inspiration and an artistic sense I never knew I had. It has been a fabulous journey— and I'm still traveling.

The first piece I entered in our 1988 Quilt Show won a Blue Ribbon and I was totally blown away. I seldom send quilts to other contests but over the years most of my entries in the NSQG shows have garnered ribbons. It is always a surprise and a thrill and it spurs me on. In the last few years I have tried to broaden my skills into the art quilt area. The fascinating thing about quilting is that there are always new techniques to learn and new products with which to experiment. Meanwhile I continue to do traditional quilting. Appliqué is a favorite, but arthritic hands limit that recently.

Speaking particularly to the newer members who don't know me, I have always been an active Guild member filling many positions over the years—including 2-year terms as President, twice. That involvement, which began as a Show Committee member my first year, is what really made me feel connected to the Guild and started the friendships I cherish today. I urge you to do the same. Get involved to truly enjoy this Guild.

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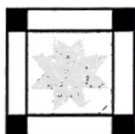
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PROPOSED BY-LAWS REVISION

The attached document contains the proposed By-Laws revision, as approved by the Board on February 27, 2006, and is being distributed to the membership for its consideration. It is the intention of the Board to conduct a question and answer session for interested members at the April 18th general meeting. The vote on the proposed By-Laws will take place at the annual meeting on May 16, 2006.

Most of the proposed changes are ones of language, made to clarify what had already been written. Some of the Articles and Sections are reorganized or reordered, again for clarity's sake, or to remove duplications or contradictions. Some proposed changes, however, are more substantive.

Articles V, VI, and VII address the basic structure and the operation of the Guild: its elected officers and how they are nominated and elected, the appointed standing committees, and the term of office and duties of all. Proposed changes made to these Articles were based on the following considerations: 1) recognizing that Programs and Education are closely linked in responsibility and importance, 2) the need to distribute responsibilities more evenly among elected officers, 3) providing an underlying committee structure to provide continuity of leadership, 4) giving the President some flexibility to address special situations, 5) utilizing members' special talents without the constraints of Board meeting attendance and term limits, while insuring that traditional activities will continue, 6) correcting the balance of elected officers and standing committees, and 7) giving committed members the opportunity of gaining the experience necessary to move into positions of leadership.

With these considerations in mind, the proposed By-Laws would add the position of Vice-president: Education, would create the new position of Vice-president: Communications, would combine the two secretary jobs into a single Secretary position, would create an appointed position of Assistant to the President, would move Boutique to the Special Events committee, and would increase the number of consecutive years that a member may serve on the Board to 6 years. The Newsletter and website would be under the auspices of the VP: Communications, recognizing that both these positions are critical to the success of the Guild, which could not continue as an effective and successful organization without consistent and timely communication among its members.

PROPOSED BY-LAWS
OF
NORTHERN STAR QUILTERS' GUILD, LTD
As approved by NSQG Board of Directors, February 27, 2006

ARTICLE I: NAME

- Section 1. The name of this corporation shall be Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd. (the Guild).
- Section 2. The registered office of the Guild shall be P.O. Box 232, Somers, NY 10589. The location of the principal office may be changed by the Board of Directors. The Guild may also have offices in such other places as the Board of Directors may from time to time designate.
- Section 3. The Guild is a not-for-profit corporation.

ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

- Section 1. The purpose of the Guild shall be to promote interest in, and encourage participation in, the art of quilting; to stimulate and coordinate the efforts and talents of individuals interested in quilting; and to maintain a club for the social enjoyment of its members.
- Section 2. The Guild shall strive to achieve its purposes:
- a. By establishing lines of communication among members for the stimulation of thought, exchange of ideas, mutual assistance, and enhancement of individual strengths.
 - b. By providing educational activities related to quilting to help members achieve their highest level of technical proficiency and artistic expression.
 - c. By sponsoring an annual quilt show, open to the public.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Membership in the Guild shall be open to anyone upon payment of appropriate dues. A record shall be kept on file for each member.
- Section 2. Members shall be active in some phase of the art of quilting, or genuinely interested in the development and preservation of this art.
- Section 3. Members shall be eligible to vote on the amending of By-Laws and the election of officers and shall be entitled to participate fully in the operation and activities of the Guild.
- Section 4. If a member is delinquent in dues, the member's name shall be dropped from the membership list, and such member shall have no privileges.
- Section 5. A member may be reinstated upon payment of current dues.
- Section 6. No person shall be discriminated against because of race, color, religion, age, national origin, sex, or handicap.

ARTICLE IV: ANNUAL DUES

- Section 1. Membership dues are payable annually and shall be applicable to the Guild's fiscal year (July 1 to June 30).
- Section 2. Dues shall not be refundable.
- Section 3. The Board of Directors shall determine dues to meet the operating expenses of the Guild.
- Section 4. Notification of a change in dues shall be given to the general membership prior to the end of the fiscal year.

ARTICLE V: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Section 1. The Board of Directors shall be comprised of the Elected Officers and the Chairpersons of all Standing Committees. The immediate past President shall be an ex-officio member.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Guild and shall be responsive to the input of the membership. In matters before the Board that do not otherwise require the prior approval of the membership, all decisions of the Board of Directors shall be final.
- Section 3. The number of members of the Board of Directors may be changed only by amendment to the By-Laws.
- Section 4. Members of the Board of Directors may serve for no more than six (6) consecutive years.
- Section 5. Each member of the Board of Directors shall have one vote. Any Board position shared by more than one person shall have only one vote.
- Section 6. All members of the Board of Directors shall fulfill the duties of their office without compensation.
- Section 7. Any Board member not performing her/his duties in a proper or satisfactory manner may be removed from that position by the Board of Directors following an affirmative vote of the majority of its members, provided that fifteen day's written notice of such removal shall have been given the incumbent.
- Section 8. Each Board member, whether or not then in office, shall be indemnified by the Guild against all costs and expenses reasonably incurred by, or imposed upon her/him in connection with, or arising out of, any action or proceeding in which she/he may be involved, by reason of her/his being or having been a Board member of the Guild, except in relation to matters in which such Board member has been adjudged liable to the Guild for negligence or misconduct in the performance of her/his duties.

ARTICLE VI: ELECTED OFFICERS

- Section 1. The officers of the Guild shall be President, Vice President: Communications, Vice President: Education, Vice President: Membership, Vice President: Programs, Vice President: Quilt Show, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- Section 2. Officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, by a majority of the members present.
- Section 3. Officers shall serve for one year, or until they shall resign or be removed from office, and can succeed themselves in office only once. Their term of office shall begin July 1.
- Section 4. When an office other than that of the President becomes vacant, it shall be filled by a recommendation of a majority of the Board of Directors.
- Section 5. In the absence of the President, or in the event the President resigns or is removed from office, the duties of the President shall be performed by the officer next in succession: Vice President: Membership, Vice President: Communications, Vice President: Programs, Vice President: Education, Vice President: Quilt Show, Secretary, Treasurer.
- Section 6. Officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these By-Laws, and those set down in the Policies of the Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd. Said policies shall be written and approved by the Board of Directors and shall not be in conflict with these By-Laws.
- Section 7. The President shall select a Nominating Committee, of which she shall be a member, and which shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.
- Section 8. The Nominating Committee shall propose a slate of officers and present this slate to the Board of Directors for its approval.
- Section 9. The approved slate of officers shall be presented to the membership at a general meeting at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting. At the time of such general meeting, nominations from the floor, by any member, will be accepted.
- Section 10. All the nominees for office shall be printed in the newsletter of the Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd. prior to the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VII: STANDING COMMITTEES

- Section 1. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall be appointed by the President, with the approval of the majority of Elected Officers.
- Section 2. Chairpersons shall serve for one year, or until they shall resign or be removed from office. Their term of office shall begin on July 1.
- Section 3. The duties of the Chairpersons of all Standing Committees are set down in the Policies of the Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd.
- Section 4. The Standing Committees shall be:
- a. Assistant to the President
 - b. Charitable Activities
 - c. Hospitality
 - d. Library
 - e. Special Events

ARTICLE VIII: MEETINGS

- Section 1. Meetings of the membership shall be held monthly, except in July and August. The time and date of these meetings will be fixed by the Board of Directors prior to the end of the fiscal year.
- Section 2. The May general meeting shall be considered the Annual Meeting. Members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting date.
- Section 3. A quorum at a general membership meeting shall be the members in attendance. A majority of a quorum may decide any questions before the Guild.
- Section 4. The Board of Directors shall meet monthly for the purpose of transacting, in accordance with the current By-Laws, all ordinary business relating to the Guild.
- Section 5. It shall be the duty of each member of the Board of Directors to attend the meetings of the Board of Directors and the monthly general membership meetings. Any Board member may be removed from office if absent from more than five (5) meetings.
- Section 6. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall be at least 51% of the members presently serving.
- Section 7. Special meetings of the membership may be called by the Board of Directors. No business shall be transacted except that mentioned in the call of the special meeting. At least ten (10) days' notice must be given before a special meeting of the membership is held.
- Section 8. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called. No business shall be transacted except that mentioned in the call of the special meeting. A quorum shall be at least two thirds (2/3) of the members of the Board of directors presently serving. At least three (3) days' notice must be given before a special meeting of the Board of Directors is held.

ARTICLE IX: AUDIT

- Section 1. The Treasurer shall submit the Guild's financial books and records for an annual compilation, review, or audit, as required, after the close of the fiscal year, and at any other time it is deemed necessary.
- Section 2. The records and books shall be submitted to a Certified Public Accountant for the purpose specified in Section 1. The cost of such action shall be a legitimate Guild expense.
- Section 3. The Board of Directors shall require two copies, certified as true, of the results. One shall go to the Treasurer's file, and the other the to Secretary's file with the corporate records.

ARTICLE X: DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY

- Section 1. The Board of Directors, upon the dissolution of the corporation, by the Board of Directors, and by the vote of the membership, shall pay or make provision for paying all liabilities of the Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd.
- Section 2. In the event of dissolution, the Board of Directors, if possible, shall dispose of all the assets of the Guild exclusively to serve the purposes of quilt-related, charitable, educational, or scientific organizations, provided they qualify as an exempt organization under section 501© (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended.
- Section 3. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the Northern Star Quilters" Guild, Ltd. Is located at that time.
- Section 4. Said court shall determine the purposes for use, and the organization or organizations to receive such assets.

ARTICLE XI: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

- Section 1. Amendments to the By-Laws may be:
- a. Proposed in writing by the Board of Directors
 - b. Proposed in writing by a member or members
 - c. Recommended by a By-Law Review Committee, convened by the President no less than every five (5) years, beginning in 2005.
- Section 2. After approval by a majority of the Board of Directors, proposed amendment or amendments shall be mailed to the general membership, and shall be published in the Northern Star Quilters' Guild, Ltd. Newsletter. The proposed amendment or amendments shall be voted on by ballot by the members no sooner than thirty (30) days after notification to the members.
- Section 3. Amendments shall be approved by a majority of the members voting.

ARTICLE XII: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

- Section 1. The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall govern the meetings of this Guild in all cases in which they are consistent with these By-Laws.
