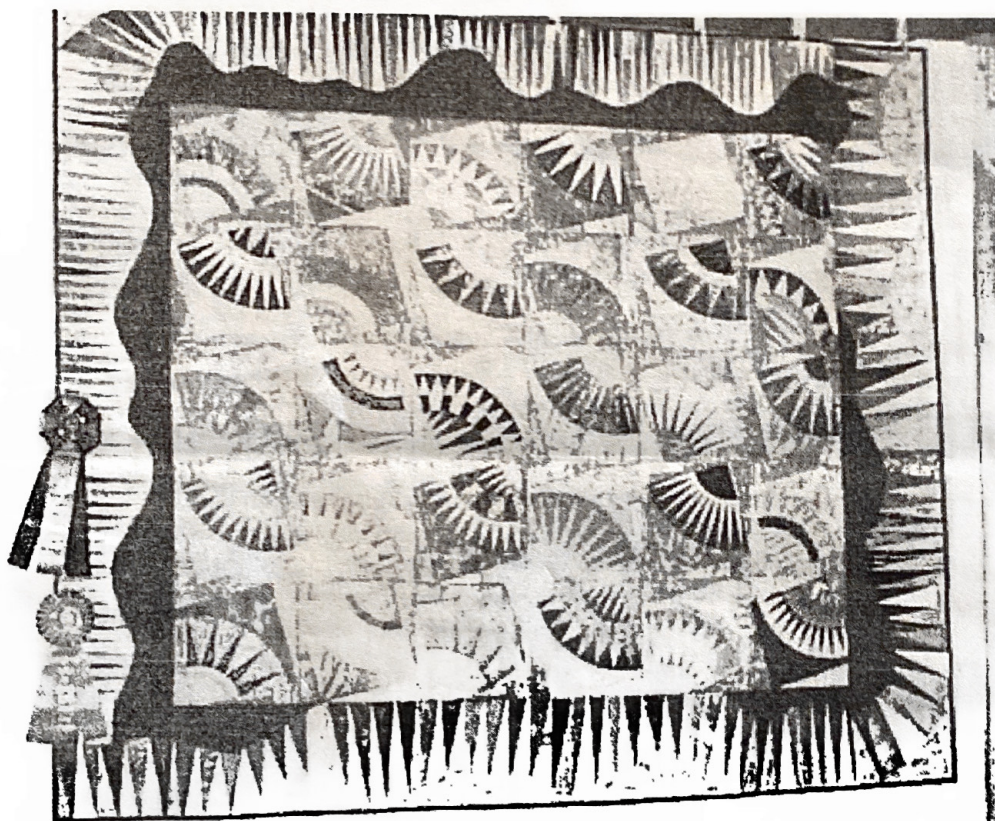

Programs

Our May lecturer is one of my most favorite artists. Joy Saville's work is truly extraordinary.

She was born in Nebraska and currently resides in New Jersey. Her work is informed by color. Cotton, linen, silk and wool fabrics are used in a unique process of piecing which results in a subtle but densely textured painterly surface. Each abstract, non-objective concept is developed as a personal expression or a response to a specific site.

Patricia MaLarcher describes her work at the Newark Museum:

"In Joy Saville's fabric panels, color yields light; geometric piecwork breaks up into fluid surfaces; sensuousness is permeated with intelligence . . . one is pulled in by the mosaic-like richness of surfaces constructed of thousands of fabric chips, irregular in shape but reminiscent of flattened crystals."

Her lecture is titled, "An Approach to the Creative Process." We will be treated to a slide show of her beautiful canvases.

Comfort Quilts

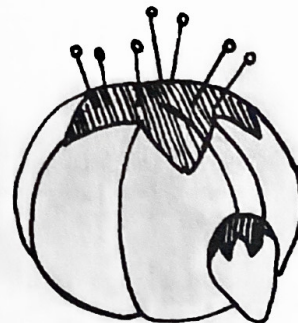
I hope you saw our display at the Quilt Show — wonderful quilts, as usual — and we were proud to show the world what big hearts and skilled hands our membership has.

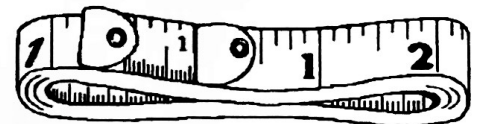
