Our "Featured Books" for November are Story Quilts by Mary Mashuta, The New Quilt 1 and The New Quilt 2, by Taunton Press.

Story Quilts: Telling Your Tale in Fabric is written by our November Guest Speaker, Mary Mashuta. It is a wonderful collection of original commemorative quilts and the stories they each have to tell. Design and technical information is also given so that you can create your own "Story Quilt".

The New Quilt 1 and The New Quilt 2 are two new donations to our library received from Taunton Press. Both books are full-color photographic presentations of quilts included in the prestigious "Dairy Barn Quilt National" show for the years 1991 and 1992, respectively. Quilts included represent the most innovative and avante garde work being done today. Many thanks to Taunton Press for their generous contribution.

Provi Svensson has researched and assembled all of the <u>Member-of-the-Month</u> interviews and photographs from the last few years into a lovely new binder, which will be available for your enjoyment at the Library Table. Little Quilts All Through the House by Alice Berg, et al - A fun and friendly book containing instructions for 18 "homespun" little quilts, as well as hints on fabric selection and other techniques to give your quilts an antique folk-art look. A section of beautifully photographed room settings shows you how to use little quilts to decorate and "warm up" your home.

Quilts for Baby: Easy as ABC by

tops to cut and piece in four hours or
less! A great book for beginners wanting
to make a quick and easy baby quilt.

Piecemakers Country Store by the Piecemakers - A new book in the "Quilt Shop Series" by That Patchwork Place. Fans of the Piecemakers' calendar quilts will love this collection of eight whimsical and original quilts using piecing, applique, and embroidery. Also included are recipes, poems and stories by the Piecemakers.

Animas Quilts by Jackie Robinson - Another book in the "Quilt Shop Series". Detailed directions for nine geometric pieced quilts inspired by the old West and Colorado Rockies, home of the Animas Quilt Shop.


We still have a few members on the Library Black List. New candidates are quickly approaching inclusion, so please bring those overdue books in to the meeting!

November's Nine-Patch color is any shade of BLUE. Each patch should be a 6.5 inch square composed of nine 2.5" squares. You can alternate light and dark or use nine different blues. Use up your scraps, do whatever you want, but please make sure all fabrics are pre-washed.


