

- Please explain your reflections in 25 words or less
- Deadline for submission: January meeting 2004



Jette Buch was born and grew up in Copenhagen, Denmark. Before coming to the U.S. she much enjoyed crocheting, knitting and sewing her own clothes. After moving to the U.S. in 1992, she became fascinated by quilting, which is only now becoming popular in Europe. She is particularly intrigued by the manual skills involved in complicated applique and hand quilting. Via many quilting friends from Japan, she has become very

interested in the colors of the Orient. This resulted in a quilt “My version of Circles of the East” made of Japanese fabric which was the first to bring her an award. The most recent award was won with a personal interpretation of the classical Baltimore design. She is particularly fond of bright spring/summer colors rather than those of fall and winter. Flowers are very close to her heart and the next project is a version of “Dear Jane’s” quilt. Another dream is to make a monochrome white quilt focusing on intricate quilting patterns.

The 2005 Raffle Quilt Is Born....

The 2005 raffle quilt will be blue and white with pastel flowers. There is patchwork, applique, and hand quilting, techniques to appeal to many at all skill levels. Raffle Quilt Charity Nominations

There have been four nominations for the Quilt Raffle proceeds. Carefully consider all four and make your decision. Votes will be counted at the November meeting.

Blythdale is a children's hospital dedicated to improving the health status and quality of life of children with complex medical and rehabilitative needs. Seventy-five percent of the patients receive Medicaid, the remaining have HMOs and private insurance, but there are many services that are not reimbursable. The mission of Blythdale is to provide the children with the proper and needed care without consideration of payment.

Hospice Care in Westchester and Putnam is dedicated to providing comprehensive services for patients with advanced life-threatening illnesses. Home care is provided for the treatment of pain and other symptoms to make the patient more comfortable. Insurance carriers like Medicare and Medicaid cover a portion of these services, however, there is a large fraction that is not reimbursed. Hospice relies on the support and generosity of the community to provide specialty services at no cost.

Support Connection provides emotional, social and educational support services to women, their families and friends affected by breast and ovarian cancer. Services include support groups, educational forums and lectures, one-on-one peer support, or 24-hour hotlines, resource library, quarterly newsletter and program calendar and referrals. Ongoing wellness programs include meditation and yoga as well as retreats and days of wellness at an off-site facility. All services are provided free of charge.

Women's Resource Center provides advocacy, education and services to the community in order to create a safe, supportive environment that strives to eliminate violence against women and children and to promote gender equality. Comprehensive services are provided in four key areas: sexual assault, domestic violence, and children's program and life skills training. Fund raising closes the gap between fees and government support and the actual cost of providing services.



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Block Contest 2004

The Northern Star Quilters' Guild 2004 Block Contest will be "All Things Silver." We invite you to help us celebrate our 25th Anniversary by making a block. A World of Quilts XXV will be held on Saturday, May 1st and Sunday, May 2nd, 2004. You are most welcome to come and see your blocks displayed. And, in addition to our contest, there will be over 200 quilts, special exhibits and terrific speakers.

THEME: "All Things Silver"

SIZE: A 12" square block that measures an accurate 12 1/2" square, including seam allowances. Do not bind or finish edges.

FABRICS: You must use at least one batik fabric and something silver—either thread, a fabric or a washable embellishment. All fabrics must be 100% cotton, and must be pre-washed.

METHOD: You may piece and/or applique by hand and/or machine. Do not back (unless you need a foundation, as with crazy quilting) or quilt the block.

DEADLINE: March 1, 2004.

Entries must be received by March 1st. No exceptions!

PRIZES: All entrants will receive our beautiful show pin. All finalists will receive fabric packets. The finalist blocks will be assembled into a quilt top that will be awarded in a random drawing to one of the finalists.
