Once on the site, you can view what others have to barter and also list what you may want to sell. The address is :

The idea for *Barter Babes* grew from the creator's frustration at being charged a fee by her Australian bank to purchase US tender to pay American vendors for their fabrics, patterns, notions, etc.

In addition, items no longer wanted by one person, might be high on someone else's wish list, which makes sense environmentally and economically.

The list is free to join, and is kept as a 'register' of people who are willing to barter goods. Nobody (except the Postal Service) benefits financially, and all transactions are the responsibility of the trading partners concerned.

All quilts started this day will eventually find their way to some charitable organization serving children.

Registration will continue at the October meeting, where samples will again be shown. Cost is only \$5. If you would like to participate, Pat Baker (914-279-8840) will be happy to get a call and put you in the class of your choice. Class size is limited. BRING

- Basic supplies (scissors, pins, seam ripper, etc.)
- Neutral thread, in both medium and dark
- Rotary cutter with a new blade and mat to cut on.
- 2 Rulers for cutting: 6"x24" and a smaller one if you wish, and a 8", 12" or 15" square.
- Sewing machine with a new needle.
- Two bobbins filled with one of your neutral threads
- Pencil and a sharpener or a fine-line automatic pencil.
- Quilter's Quik Quarter
- Little wooden "iron"
- Extension cord

Do not bring irons.

Do not bring fabric.

Do not buy any of the above if you do not already have it -- quilters share!

Please have your name on all tools to avoid confusion.

If you own one of the new craft irons, and are willing to let it be used, please call me at the number below.

Parking is limited. PLEASE CARPOOL if possible! We have special permission to park for the day in the following areas: on Bedford Road (Old Route 117) or on Valley Road and other roads west of Bedford Road (the church side!). **DO NOT PARK** east of Bedford Road (across the street from the church). Do not block driveways. And, do not park anywhere it's marked "No Parking At Any Time".

Ravelings

I vote for double bindings — especially when making a gift. Yes, it's easier and quicker to bring a backing around to the front to finish the edges of a quilt, but this leaves only one layer of fabric. Since it is the edge that gets the heaviest wear, one skinny layer in that vulnerable position does not seem prudent. In addition, an added binding can easily be removed and replaced when it becomes ragged. If only one layer is used, when it begins to wear, often the wear eats into the quilt proper before it is noticed, or before some procrastinating quilter (NOT ME!) gets around to repairing it.
