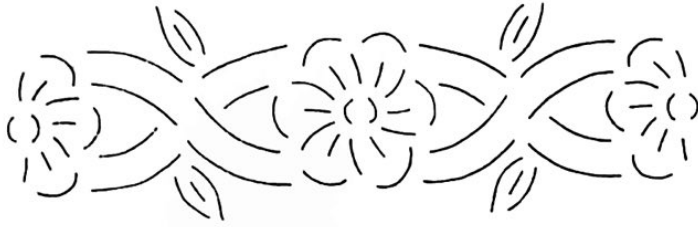
Ginny Watson is still working hard. She has some new surprises for us in the plans for this year's quilt show.

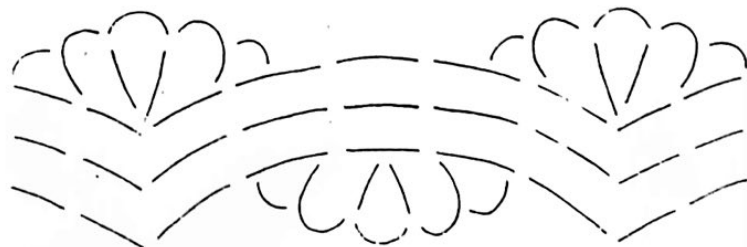

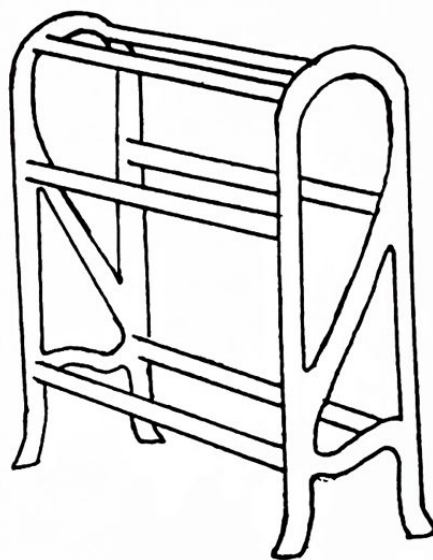

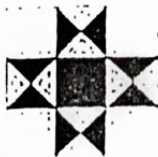

CRITERIA FOR APPLICATION FOR WORLD OF QUILTS VI GRANT MONEY

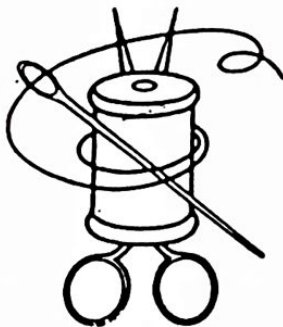
- 1) NSQG Sponsor

IT IS NEVER TOO LATE; BUT WHY WAIT?

The year was 1944. My soldier was overseas, and I had found a new love. I was completely smitten with "everything early American". Someday soon I would have my own home furnished with antiques and old pine, braided rugs on the floors, and a handmade quilt on my bed. I bought my first quilt booklet published by J. & P. Coats and Clark's Threads at a cost of 10¢. I was fascinated--- patterns such as Mexican Cross, Four Doves in a Window, Rose of Sharon; but my quilt would have to wait. Fabric was 39¢ a yard and far too expensive on my tight budget. My two dollars a week allowance was already covering subway fare from Westchester to 42nd St. five days a week (50¢), seven 3¢ stamps a week (letters to my soldier), war-time nylons, and an occasional 5¢ candy bar.

My soldier came home and we furnished our little attic apartment with an oak kitchen set, some livingroom chairs, and a cherry wood bedroom set. Mama made a beautiful crocheted spread. We started our antique collection with silver demitasse spoons and my husband made a lovely pine spoon rack. I bought another quilt book for 10¢.

A daughter joined our family; and we bought my first sewing machine to make frilly pinafores, soft nighties and colorful playsuits. My fabric cache started to grow. I saved every scrap, learned to always buy a "little extra" and cut carefully.

When another daughter joined the clan, there were more dolls clothes to sew, Halloween costumes to design, school meetings to attend and cookies to bake. I didn't forget my quilt. The year was 1957, and the time had finally arrived. I was ready for my first quilt; with carless abandon I cut 4" squares of plaids, checks, polka dots, Christmas fabric, small prints, large prints, and tough as iron muslin from worn white trousseau sheets. I ran up a nine-patch quilt in no time at all by machine, backed it with "3 yds. for \$1.00" unwashed, unbleached muslin, and used a new flannel blanket for batting. I sewed the edges together neatly and tacked it randomly. I put it on my bed, and was very pleased.

The ball was rolling and it was time for a serious hand-pieced quilt; but it was also time for leading Brownies, teaching Sunday school and sewing Barbie Doll clothes. It was time for restoring a very old house where Linda could have her canopy bed and Marilyn could have an antique brass bed. My quilts would look so beautiful on those beds.

In 1965, the house was restored, and "Peter-come-lately" joined the family. Linda was in college, Marilyn was a great fourteen year old helper, fabric scraps were in abundance and my quilt could wait no longer. I chose my favorite pattern - The Double Wedding Ring. I made one set of cardboard templates with ¼" seam allowance included, marked my pastel scrapes with a thin paint Magic Marker, and embarked on a two year venture. How could anything with such a wrong start turn out so right for me? LOVE!!!!

Now I was ready to accept dear Ma Walkers invitation to "come a quiltin' with us Wednesdays". "Us" was the Ladies Aid Society of the Laciest Avenue Methodist Church who for many, many years quilted pieced tops for a small fee. The ladies were Ma Walker, Macie, Jeanett Millie, Ida, Aunt Florence, and many others. I learned all about quilting bees with wonderful teachers. I learned to stretch a quilt backing filler and top on an old full sized frame taut enough to bounce a coin; I learned that old flannel blankets as fillers gave quilts an old look; I learned to hide knots, make tiny stitches, and quilt "in the ditch". Cares of the day were completely forgotten as we stitched, then rolled the finished portion and sat even closer together.

The ladies Aid Society no longer quilts pieced tops as many of them are gone. I have sweet memories, a duplicate of their frame and many more quilts to my credit. Quilts for six grandchildren, Turkey Track for Linda, two pieced tops waiting, two more in the making and Marilyn's in the planning. Peter enjoys an applique on old denim and also the first nine patch that has over the years acquired a pre-shrunk back and many quilting stitches.
