# A Message from the President

We are nearing a quarter century of success and it is the perfect time to strengthen our organizational structure and refocus our energy toward our main purpose: EDUCATION.

Our guild has long been known for bringing in the best teachers that we can find to educate our own membership. We are fortunate to have so many authors and lecturers in today's quilt market. Yet, the costs are significantly increasing. What was once an industry of speakers willing to lodge in a members house, eat at a family table and travel at off peak rates, has changed. Now lecturer contracts require a hotel room, rental car, airfare, two-day workshops plus speaking engagements.

Our programs have been funded in the past from our quilt show profits. The quilt show was a charitable activity even before our guild existed. When the guild was incorporated in 1983 as a not-for-profit organization, it became a "public benefit corporation," or a 501©(3). We have tax-exempt status based on the fact that we use all of our profits for the purpose of educating the public in the art of quilting.

Unfortunately, our quilt show attendance may be declining. Our expenses are increasing. We increasingly become more professional and hire help instead of using volunteers. If these trends continue, the quilt show needs to be more focused on raising public awareness about quilting, and we need to find other ways to raise revenues to continue our mission.

The good news is our financial position is currently strong. We have the financial ability to cover the changes that we are currently enduring. My recommendation is that we start using the funds from the silent auction to fund the big name speakers for the following year's quilt show. This will raise the quilt show revenues and increase our educational opportunities for our membership and the public. All this will give us the opportunity to continue to quilt, show our work, and most of all, enjoy the company of those who share our passion.

- Have one or more representative from the organization present at the show (Saturday and Sunday)
- · Have one or more representative present at the June meeting to receive the donation.



You may use any available technique; i.e. whatever you need to get a recognizable portrait. Techniques may include painting, piecing, applique, beadwork, snippets, etc. Must be in "portrait orientation."

**Size:** 18 inches wide by 22 inches tall (a fat quarter). Your quilt must be ready to hang, with a 4 inch sleeve, and a label on the back with your title, and name and address, as the quilts will be going to the Lancaster Quilt show in April.

**Due Date:** January meeting, to be displayed and voted on February 2005 meeting.

# Square Robin Quilts

The square robin format used last year seemed to please our quilters. It certainly made lovely quilts, so we'll do it again this year. To those of you who are not familiar with this project, the resulting quilts are designated to go to Comfort Quilts, to be distributed to sick children and teens; and a few go to elderly patients in nursing homes. Groups of five quilters are formed. Each member will make five blocks, all the same, to be exchanged with the other group members at monthly meetings.

I will coordinate fabrics from the Comfort Quilts collection and give each group member a piece of fabric to be used in the design of her blocks. Some of this fabric must be used, in small or large quantity, in every block. The other fabrics can be anything you have that works with the required piece. All fabric should be cotton and prewashed.

The block size is 8 1/2" (finished 8"). I will give general directions to follow in the newsletter each month. You select a block that you like from the directions, and make five of them for exchange. Remember, the blocks are small and are for children. Don't make them too complicated.

Blocks will be made and exchanged for five months. Then, in March, they will be assembled into a quilt top in any way you want. Hopefully we will have the tops ready for Show & Tell in April. Then, you get them back and start to quilt at your own pace. If it's not possible for you

to do the quilting, the blocks can be turned in for completion by Comfort Quilts. However, we encourage you to take the opportunity to practice your machine quilting on these quilts.



### Member of the Month: Tamar Drucker

Born and raised in Israel, I moved to the United States in 1985, and joined the NSQG in 1987. When I was growing up, sewing was not for me. I loved sitting in my room, cutting and snipping all kinds of designs from all kinds of materials. I was always sketching something.

After my daughter was born, I started to enjoy cross stitch and appliqué projects, being inspired by magazines I saw in the occupational therapy ward. My profession back in Israel was as a physical therapist in a hospital. Soon after moving here, I met Susanna Valentinetti, who became my quilting mentor, and who later introduced me to the Guild.

Since joining the Guild, my quilting has greatly evolved, taking a lot of influence from traditional Japanese artwork, Guild guest artists, and artwork using other mediums. My favorite form of quilting is appliqué, or fabric raw edge collage.

While raising my kids, I felt I had to get back into the creative grind. My first quilt was a twin size Grandma's fan. Without any sewing machine training, I did everything by hand. It took three years. After that experience, I realized it was time to get a sewing machine. My machine quilting is improving, but has a long way to go.

I enjoy creating the visual composition, searching for the right fabrics, and then getting into the sewing. Quilting is really a wonderful outlet, I always joke that it's my therapy, my oxygen; but it's true. I'm often inspired by certain fabric designs, sometimes by a challenge, or maybe a book.

I feel very lucky to be included in the Guild, and to share the friendship and joy of that which we love to do, regardless of style or level of knowledge.
