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

Letter From The President

Recently there was a Yahoo article that spoke about change. "For students entering college this fall, e-mail is too slow, phones have never had cords and the computers they played with as kids are now in museums....The Class of 2014 has fewer incoming freshmen who know how to write in cursive or have ever worn a wristwatch." Meeting

November's special speaker is **Dianne Hire.** Diane's presentation is **Oxymorons:** *Absurdly Logical Quilts.* "Oxy…" is a collection of forty quilts based upon oxymorons, the juxtaposition of completely contradictory words created by forty uniquely different quilt makers. View slides of quilts and hear how these mismatched phrases, nonsensical upon investigation of meaning influenced designs and the reasons behind those designs.

Workshop

Dianne's workshop, **Curvaceous Squares**, is on November 15 (*note Monday*) at the North Salem Volunteer Ambulance Corps building (NSVAC). **Square Curves**? What? Exactly what does that mean? Create easy, template-free, intuitively designed blocks of inset curves that become squares. Discover ways to combine the curvy-blocks into a motion-filled wall hanging that is fast to assemble and in three optional designs: broken circles, randomly curved squares, or meandering dancing curves. If you use basic bold brights in nearly-solid fabrics, the quilt is exceptional. By the end of the day, you may have your Curvaceous Squares completely sewn together and ready to quilt. The Holiday Boutique will take place on November 16th from 6 to 7 p.m. before the start of the general meeting. The Boutique is your chance to purchase lovely items handmade by our own Guild members. We have a good variety of items this year so come early and do some early holiday shopping! Bring family and friends as there

purchasing their own I Spy fabrics or purchasing one of my kits. My kits are composed of 200 different 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " conversation print squares cut from washed and ironed 100% cotton fabrics. I have 12 kits available and they cost \$30 each. Please let me know ASAP, but no later than two weeks before Super Saturday if you wish to purchase a kit. Students not purchasing a kit must bring 200 pre-cut 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares of conversation prints in addition to their background fabric. Sewing machine required.

Kendell Storm – CREATING EMBROIDERY DESIGNS ON YOUR COMPUTER

Do you have an embroidery machine? Do you have an embroidery digitizing program? Have you used them yet? In this class, Kendell will show you how to digitize a design using your computer in order to create an embroidered nametag, bookmark or anything you can think of. You will learn how to save the designs as embroidery files for many brands of sewing machines.

The second half of class will cover basics of machine embroidery including stabilizing projects, thread choices and hooping the projects successfully. We will stitch out the design and give the result to one of the lucky students!

This is a great class for anyone that owns an embroidery machine with an embroidery program for creating designs. If you are "afraid" of breaking the machine or just haven't mastered the idea of machine embroidery yet, take this class. If you have a laptop computer with your digitizing program loaded and able to open, I will be able to get you started using your own program to do some of the things we will learn in class.

Suzanne Sunday – FREE MOTION QUILTING A REVERSIBLE TABLE RUNNER

This class is for people who have never free motion guilted or who need to work on

Several opportunities exist for your early participation in the for quilt show: 9 inch squares of fabric and batting, and strips of fabric 3 to 5 inches wide and 9 inches long for the Build-a-Block activity at the Show (see **Cathie Billings**); a small quilt with a perimeter of approximately 100 inches donated for the Silent Auction (see **Karen Carlson & Carol Auer**); and antique quilts to be hung in the Invitational
